Situation Analysis

Illabo Public School is a two teacher school, situated between Junee and Cootamundra, in the Southwest Slopes of NSW. The school is situated in Layton Street, Illabo, just off the Olympic Highway.

The school was established in 1884 to service a local stone quarry and the railway.

Parents are asked not to call during lesson times on Monday and Thursday (non-office days) to avoid interruptions. Please call during recess or lunchtime if possible on this day.

Procedure in Case of Emergencies

Parents **notify the school of emergency contacts during the enrolment process**. This enables the school to contact the parents or nominated person in case of sickness or accident. Please keep the school updated of any changes in address, telephone number or emergency contact number. A *change of detail* electronic form is available for your use through the *Skoolbag* App.

School Bus

The majority of students travel to and from school by bus. Department regulations are circulated periodically explaining bus travel rules. **Misbehaviour can result in refusal to carry the student concerned**. Pupils are supervised until boarding the bus each afternoon. They are assembled in bus and walking lines under the supervision of a teacher. All K-2 students are entitled to free bus travel irrespective of their distance from school.

Parents, guardians and students need to go to the above site for new applications or to update their details. It is essential that parents notify any changes of address as bus travel is funded only to the home address.

School Drive Subsidy

The School Drive Subsidy is available to NSW residents in areas where there is no public transport, to drive an eligible student all or part of the way to school. The subsidy is only intended to partly offset the cost of using a private vehicle to drive the eligible student and is not intended to cover all costs. Supervision

Children are supervised from 8.45am to 9.15am (playground equipment is out of bounds at this time), and at recess and lunchtime in accordance with Departmental regulations. **Children who arrive at school prior to 8.45am are required to sit on the veranda and are not under supervision**.

Attendance

Children are required by law to attend school regularly. If a child is absent a note explaining the reason for absence (illness, family commitments) should be given to the teacher **on the child's return to school**. Absent note proformas are sent home at the beginning of each year on a newsletter and may be obtained as needed from the office, the school's website or sent electronically through the *Skoolbag* App.

Leave Pass

Children will require a note from their parent or guardian to the principal to indicate any time the child is required to vary hours of attendance at school, e.g. dental, doctor's appointment. **A note is required if you wish your child to leave the school at any time during school hours**. Please also sign the partial absence register in the office as your child is leaving or arriving back at school.

Parents and Citizens Association (P&C)

Meetings for Illabo School P&C are held at the Illabo Hotel on a Thursday (once a month), from 6:30pm (or as decided at previous meeting). \$1.00 membership per person per annum allows you to vote on issues.

Parent Assistance

- Label clearly with full name ALL possessions your child will take to school eg raincoat, hat, bag, pencil case, drink bottle etc.
- Take an interest in your child's school activities, encourage leisure reading habits and be selective in your child's viewing of television and video/computer games. Encourage your child to be selective.
- Discuss the school rules and rights and responsibilities with your child
- Discuss the importance of cleanliness and hygiene with your child. Parents are asked to ensure that children attend to their personal hygiene and uniform cleanliness each morning
- Support your child's homework program. It should be a purposeful learning experience to consolidate, extend or enrich class work. All children are strongly encouraged to read each night a book at their appropriate level.
- MONEY AND VALUABLES.: Valuables and large amounts of money should not be brought to school.

Homework

Homework is available for all K-6 **each week** for spelling, reading and mathematics. Regular time put aside each afternoon to complete homework will help establish good study patterns. It is hoped each child can read for 10-30 minutes each night, depending on age, from any material of interest to them e.g. home readers, library books, magazines, newspapers etc.

An information booklet regarding the Illabo PS Homework System is available for parents and is provided for each family, and can also be found on the school's website.

Homework is an optional activity and is at the discretion of each family for their child/ren to participate.

Lunch orders

The Illabo Hotel n' General Store provides lunches ordered by students from Monday to Friday. Lunch orders can be left in the carry basket outside the office each morning. A list of items available from the store is sent home at the beginning of each year or as items or prices change and can be found on the school's website.

Scripture

Ecumenical religious instruction is conducted **weekly** on Tuesdays. Combined classes operate for all students. Parents have the right of withdrawal and a letter to the school indicating this will suffice.

Student Progress

- Individual parent/teacher interviews are conducted in Term 2.
- Written reports are sent home at the end of Semesters 1 and 2.

Parents are welcome to make an appointment at any time to discuss their child's progress in relation to achievement, attitude, application or behaviour. Student progress is formally reported to parents each semester by written report. An optional Parent/Teacher interview is available at the end of Term 2.

Assessment of students at the school is a continuous process. Teachers use a wide variety of strategies to maintain a comprehensive and ongoing record of information about each student's achievements.

A National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is administered as part of government policy. This occurs in Year 3 and Year 5 to assess literacy and numeracy skills.

Student Captains

School Captains, Vice Captains and Sports Captains are elected by all the students and staff at the end of each year for the succeeding year and named at our Speech Night.





Excursions

Excursions are actively promoted in the school and are utilised to expose children to a wide variety of cultural, social and physical experiences that offer enhanced learning opportunities. Permission notes sent out prior to each excursion must be signed and returned. Children will not be permitted to participate in an excursion without the signed permission note.

Any family having difficulty meeting the cost of the excursion is asked to contact the school. Please note that excursions are not mandatory for students to attend.

Excursions participated in by the students at Illabo School include:

- 10 lesson 'Learn to Swim' Campaign held during Terms 1 and 4 at Junee Junction Recreation and Aquatic Centre for all students.
- Small Schools 'Blackbilly Cup' Swimming Carnival at Junee Swimming Pool in Term 1 against Eurongilly, Nangus and Marrar Public Schools, with all four schools taking turns to organise.
- CDPSSA (Cootamundra District Primary School Sports Association) Swimming Carnival held in Term 1.
- Baldry Shield' Athletics Carnival at Wallendbeen for surrounding small schools, in Term 1.
- CDPSSA Cross-Country Running Carnival held in Term 2.
- CDPSSA Athletics Carnival in Term 2 or 3.
- Small Schools' Athletics Carnival at Illabo Showground (or participating school's grounds), in Term 2 or 3 for Illabo, Eurongilly and Nangus Schools, with participating school's alternating organisation.
- Life Education Van visits school annually during Term 1.
- A 1-2 day excursions for Years K-2 students is held every year.
- Sport and Recreation Camp for Years 3-6 students over 5 days, alternating with Years 3-6 major excursion every second year.
- Local one day excursions are intermittently taken as the need or opportunity arises.

General School Contribution

No general school contribution is asked for, however parents are asked to pay some costs towards students' work books each year

and excursion costs. The P&C and Illabo school account also make contributions to help with these, as they are able and encourage all families to help in fundraising activities.

Families are asked to contact the school if they are having difficulty paying their child's school account. Accounts owed by each family are sent out each term for payment.

Specialist Staffing

Specialist teachers are available through the Department to support children with disabilities, e.g. intellectual, physical and speech. They are able to visit the school on a part-time basis, depending on the particular needs of the child. Special Education Learning Support Officers are available and allocated to staff integrating children with disabilities, on a needs basis.





School Counsellor

The School Counsellor is attached to the school and visits each term. Their duties include diagnostic testing of

children, interviewing, counselling and conferencing with parents and staff. Counselling services are available to any parent. Appointments may be made by contacting the school.

Kindergarten Enrolment

Kindergarten children are eligible to commence schooling at the beginning of the year as long as they turn 5 by the 31st July in their year of enrolment in Kindergarten. Parental concerns regarding enrolment age can be discussed with the Principal.



Applications for enrolment in Kindergarten can be made from term 3 onwards in the preceding year. Orientation days are offered weekly throughout terms 3 and 4.

Please note that a birth certificate or passport must be produced for all children enrolling as well as a current proof of residential address. The Public Health (Amendment) Act 1992 also requires parents to provide the school with an immunisation certificate for children enrolling in Kindergarten.

High School Transition

Year Six students feed to a number of different high schools. All pupils participate in a transition program during term three and/or term four for their relevant high school as well as any other relevant activities set by the school.

Car Parking

All cars are asked to park from the left of the front small gate in the designated parking area or across the road, leaving the area on the right, between the signs, a clear zone ensuring safe collection of students. All children walking across the road are asked to stop, look, listen, and think before they proceed.

Motto

'Learn for Life' is the school motto incorporated in our emblem. We hope that all students will look on their time spent at Illabo School as an opportunity to learn many and varied things to better prepare them for making the most of their future lives.



House Competition

The house names take after the two animals chosen for our National Australian Emblem, the emu and kangaroo because they can't walk backwards, so are always moving forward and making progress, just as our students are doing.

Emus are bottle green and kangaroos are gold, reflecting our school as well as our national colours.

House points are awarded throughout the year and accumulated to the end of the year when the winning house is presented with the house trophy on Speech Night.



School Development Days

School Development Days are held on the first day of Terms 1, 2 and 3 and the last two days of Term 4 each year for the purpose of developing or implementing programs for the betterment of the school. **These occasions are pupil free days**, which allows all staff to take part in the day's planned activities.

Key Learning Area

Students are provided with learning opportunities in six Key Learning Areas (KLA's). These KLAs are developed by the Board of Studies, which is an independent statutory of the New South Wales Government. The Board, has representatives from all areas of education, is responsible for the development of curriculum from Kindergarten to Year 12.

The school provides ongoing evaluation and analysis of all Key Learning Areas, modifying approach and content to reflect current educational research. At all times, the stage of development and potential of each student is considered.

English (Literacy)

- incorporating talking, listening, reading, writing (including spelling and handwriting), and English as a second language

English is the learning area in which students develop competence and confidence in talking, listening, reading and writing as they learn to create and interpret texts for a range of purposes and in a variety of contexts.

Library

The children are actively encouraged to read and borrow books from the school library. Senior students are taught to use the Oliver Library System to return and borrow books. Once a week both infants and primary students have a formal library lesson and books are encouraged to be borrowed from the library on this day. Parents are asked to provide their children with a library bag to protect the borrowed books.

Mathematics (Numeracy)

- incorporating working mathematically, number patterns and algebra, data, measurement and space and geometry

Maths is the learning area in which students develop confidence and enjoyment in doing mathematical activities; knowledge, skills and understandings in the above areas; and awareness of the place of mathematics in solving problems in everyday life.

Science and Technology

- incorporating science, technology

Science and Technology is the learning area in which students learn actively about the natural and made environments through experiences which develop curiosity and which encourage investigating, designing, making and using.

The school has an advanced computer network with current operating systems and software. The current ratio of computers to children is approximately 1:1 during lesson time. The school has a fibre-optic internet connection which enables fast-speed broadband for students and staff.

Our Library has a state of the art video conferencing system which enables us to participate in virtual excursions or connect to other schools to conduct shared lessons, both of which are great tools to enrich learning.

Students also have access to a set of iPads loaded with educational apps for use in free time or to supplement learning.

History and Geography

- incorporating social studies, Australian studies and environmental education

History and Geography are the learning areas in which students gain understanding about themselves, others, our history, the environment and develop these capacities and personal qualities which will enhance their own lives and enable them to maintain or improve the quality of their environment.

Creative Arts

- incorporating music, visual arts, craft, dance and drama

Creative arts are the learning area in which students develop their capacity to create and interpret images and objects, language and movement, and music.

Personal Development, Health and Physical Education

-incorporating health education, physical education, personal development and child protection



Personal development, health and physical education is the area in which students learn to develop an active, healthy lifestyle and to interact socially with positive values, attitudes and beliefs.

Personal development programs which raise self-esteem and self-image operate in our school. Positive reinforcements through the use of teacher praise, merit awards, house points, prizes given from prize box for awards, etc. play an important role in attaining and promoting each child's positive self-esteem.

Across Curriculum Issues

In addition to the six Key Learning Areas, a number of documents on general educational issues have been implemented. These include:

- Aboriginal Education
- Gender Equity
- Multicultural Education.

School Rules

The Illabo Public School Rules are as follows:



Suspension

- A student will be suspended for the following:
- Violence or threats towards a staff member or student
- Possession of illegal drugs
- Possession of a weapon/s
- Threats of a sexual nature
- Suspension may occur if:
- A student is consistently disobedient
- Engages in criminal behaviour related to the school (e.g. vandalism, theft)
- Makes inferences of a sexual nature

Re-entry following suspension will occur after a re-entry meeting with the Principal and teacher. Students may be required to undertake a re-entry program.



Health

Allergic reactions

At Illabo we refrain from bringing peanut products to school due to allergic reactions in certain students.

Administering Medication

Schools **do not** administer medication which has not been specifically prescribed by a medical practitioner.

Diabetes, Asthma and Allergies

If your child suffers from Diabetes or has severe asthma, severe allergies or any other life threatening condition **you** will need to make an appointment with the principal to discuss the management of their condition and to organize a Health Care Action Plan from your doctor.

First Aid

An ambulance will be called to transport a child to hospital should the need arise. Every effort will be made to contact the parents or emergency contacts prior to calling an ambulance. A staff member will accompany the sick/injured child to hospital in the ambulance and stay with them until a parent or carer arrives. **The school provides Ambulance Cover for all students enrolled at the school**.

Immunisation

It cannot be stressed too highly the importance of parents having their children immunised against infectious diseases including Diphtheria-Tetanus booster and Polio Vaccination just before or after entry to school. Vaccination for Measles and Mumps should be taken before entry. The booster immunisations are highly desirable due to the closer contact children will have with others upon school enrolment. An Immunisation Certificate is required for all children prior to starting Kindergarten. Please contact your Doctor, Health Centre or Council, who will issue this on completion of the booster immunisation. These immunisations are free (available from Council or Health Centre).

Ngumba-Dal Learning Community

The Ngumba-Dal Learning Community is a joint initiative between the five public schools in the Junee Shire. The Learning Community is not a separate entity from the schools; it is the schools working together.

Ngumba-Dal is a Wiradjuri term meaning "unity", which reflects a determination of each school in the Learning Community to share resources, staff and events for the betterment of all schools.

We have chosen the motif of the goanna to visually identifying our Learning Community as it is the totem of the Wiradjuri people. The abstract nature of the image draws on modern Aboriginal artistic representations of the goanna.
