A message from Meg

If you have been to school recently you would have noticed that there has been quite a lot of action happening!

We now have a great looking shade shelter over our sandpit which allows the students to utilise it in the summer months while being sun-safe. We have also had solar panelling installed on the roof of A Block. This means that solar radiation collected on the panels will be converted to electricity which will in-turn be utilised in the operation of the building, offsetting an equivalent quantity of grid electricity that would have otherwise been required to power our new Cooler Classroom airconditioners.

Our students continue to be exposed to a range of educational opportunities to support their learning, through involvement in community excursions. We are very fortunate to have access to local expertise and knowledge, and participation and engagement from our students strengthen the connections they make with their community. Thank you to Mr Gill for coordinating the REEC excursion and to all staff for their active supervision on the day.

Congratulations to all students who have represented the school at sporting trials and events recently. We are proud of your effort and achievement. Following the REEC excursion, the school received some very positive feedback about the behaviour of the Illabo and Eurongilly students of which we are immensely proud. REEC Excursion

On Friday 21 May, Illabo PS went to the Riverina Environmental Education Centre with Eurongilly PS. Our K-2 students participated in a dinosaur program which took them on a journey through time from the beginning of life on Earth. Students investigated and observed what a palaeontologist does and what fossils are.

Our Year 3-6 students participated in a program called 'What's in a tree?' This program was led by Aunty

Joycelan Williams and was a hands-on study that introduced students to bush tucker and the ways in which the Aboriginal people used resources available to them from Mother Earth.







What's happening in the Kookaburras Classroom?

This term in literacy, the Kookaburras have been working on their writing skills. They have all been working very hard on their recount writing. They have developed an understanding of what needs to be in a recount as well as the different skills you need to effectively write one.

The students have been enjoying the whole process of writing from the planning and sequencing to the publishing.

The students were asked to independently write about what they experienced at the Riverina Environmental Education Centre, here are some examples for your enjoyment:

On Friday we went to REEC and it was fun! It was so fun that we even got to dig up dinosaur bones. We watched videos on how to be a palaeontologist. Then we stuck our hands into history bags and then took the bus back to Illabo. I said to my mum it was a busy day! - George B
